



The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS)

is a standardized way to classify businesses based on their economic activity and is essential when applying for grants and contracts. Whether you are registering as a new business or looking to expand, knowing your NAICS code(s) can help you access the right opportunities and resources.

GRANT READINESS CHECKLIST

Are you considering applying for a grant from the Rio Grande Colonias USDA Regional Food Business Center? Review the criteria outlined below to make sure you are eligible and ready!



For-profit or non-profit farm or food business (small-medium sized agricultural, value-added producer, or food system-related business)



Farm or food business must be **registered** in Texas or New Mexico.



Must have a **Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) number**. For information on how to get a UEI number visit this link.



Must have a **North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) code(s)**. For information on how to lookup your NAICS code visit this <u>link</u>.



Food producers must have an annual gross revenue of less than \$500,000. **Food businesses** must have an annual gross revenue of less than \$5,000,000.




Project request must be for an eligible **post harvest activity**. Visit our website <u>rgcolonias.org</u> for more information about eligible costs.

WHICH GRANT SHOULD I APPLY FOR?



Our Center's grant programs have unique eligibility criteria. You may qualify for one, both, or neither, depending on factors such as your business type, location, or the project you are looking to fund. If you find that you are eligible for both you are welcome to submit two applications, however, keep in mind the two applications must be for different projects and the cap on funding is still \$100,000 from our Center or any combination of other Regional Food Business Center grant opportunities. If you are deciding between grants, some considerations to keep in mind are the project duration and scope, amount of money needed, and your familiarity with applying for federal grants. Read below for additional guidance.

- You may consider applying for the Business Builder Farm and Food Grant if: your project scope is clearly defined and will cost over \$50,000; you have accessed federal grants previously and do not need technical assistance support to apply; your project will impact a substantial portion of the food system or a large population.
- You may consider applying for the Frontera Farm and Food Business Grant if: your project scope is less defined or will cost under \$50,000; you would benefit from technical assistance in business literacy or grant writing; you have never applied for federal funding; you have a project in mind but are unsure where to start; you would benefit from the support of a Business Development Coordinator who can provide guidance on a wide range of topics.




Intent to Apply Due: April 3, 2025

• Fill out the intake form on our website. You must complete this step to be eligible to submit a formal application.



Applications Close: Midnight MST on May 2, 2025



FREQUENTLY ASKED GRANT QUESTIONS



What types of businesses are eligible for grants from the Rio Grande Colonias USDA RFBC?

• The Center's grants are open to for-profit or non-profit small to medium-sized farm and food businesses. Some eligible business types include: farms and ranches; non-profits/community-based organizations; for-profit businesses; value added producers; fleet/food distribution businesses; food hubs; shared kitchens and food production sites; co-packing facilities; food storage facilities.

What kind of projects or activities can I pay for with grants from the Rio Grande Colonias USDA RFBC?

 All project budget proposals will be reviewed by both the Center and USDA to determine eligibility. Some examples of eligible post harvest costs include: working capital, staff time/labor costs, software implementation, marketing, trainings, purchase of special purpose equipment, supply chain coordination, business planning, product development, and business expansion.

What types of costs are unallowable for grants from the Rio Grande Colonias USDA RFBC?

• Some unallowable costs include: farm, gardening, and production activities and supplies (including, but not limited to soil, seeds, shovels, gardening tools, greenhouses, and hoop houses); construction; land or property acquisition; paying off existing debt; fines, penalties, damages, and other settlements; goods or services for personal use; lobbying or any political activity; alcoholic beverages; contributions or donations; fundraising and investment management costs.
